REFLECTIONS...



By Rabbi Jennie Chabon Dear Friends,

It could be argued that the oldest story in our tradition is the story of the beginning of the world. It is a deeply mystical story, and though many of you have likely heard it

before, it is also an urgent story for our time that should be told again and again. It goes like this:

In the beginning, there was only darkness. Holy darkness which was complete and perfect and filled with the Source of Life. When God decided that it was time for the creation of the world, God went through a process called *tsimtsum*, contracting God's own self in order to make room for us. Out of this darkness emerged an extraordinary ray of light that contained our world. But then, there was an accident. The vessels containing such a powerful Divine light could not contain its brilliance, and they broke, shattering into tiny fragments of light sent across the universe.

According to the mystics of our tradition, the creation of humanity is a response to the shattering of these vessels. We were created to find the hidden sparks and to gather them, no matter where they are hidden, no matter how small or how hard they are to find. That is our job as human beings, to find the hidden light in all things and to reveal it, doing our part in the restoration of the innate wholeness of the world. Tikkun olam.

I share this story this summer because it is easy to feel daunted by the vastness of the brokenness of the world and to tell ourselves that we alone can make no difference. That our outrage, our grief, our despair at what is happening to our country cannot be channeled into significant change. How can one little person make a difference? I know that feeling well. How can I possibly affect the impact of the court's decision about Roe v Wade? Or make any kind of difference in the fight for gun control? I'm just little old me in my tiny corner of the universe! But our mystics would say no no no, you are looking at it all wrong. The restoration of the world does not depend on huge acts that everyone can see. It

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

What is our North Star? Where do we want to be in five years? How do we want to get there?

Several months ago, CBT's Board of Trustees, Rabbi, and Executive Director met in a mini-retreat planned and

hosted by Keren Smith to discuss these questions and to start some strategic planning for our future.

We talked about what makes CBT unique, our strengths, our weaknesses, our opportunities, and our challenges.

The conversation was rewarding and eye-opening, helping our leadership team focus on planning for our future.

We agreed that our uniqueness and strengths come from our community and the diversity of our congregants, how warm and welcoming, and accepting we are; and from our Rabbi, who offers a unique blend of spirituality, intelligence, and, of course, musicality.

We agreed that our biggest challenge is creating a financially sustainable synagogue that maintains its intimate size.

Our opportunities stem from our uniqueness and strengths – we offer a spiritual home to Jews who have not found comfort in other synagogues, either because of the synagogue's size, ritual practice, membership, or leadership. Our challenge is how to remain who we are yet grow our community to the point where we are still small enough that no one feels lost but large enough that our financing is stable, and our budget contains annual surpluses rather than deficits. We gave ourselves a five-year horizon, and with the new fiscal year, we launched into year one of the plan.

First, the congregation approved offering Rabbi Chabon a successor contract by an overwhelming vote. She and I just signed a five-year contract that provides for our continued relationship and Rabbi Chabon's place as our spiritual leader for the future.

Second, the congregation approved a budget that gives us the tools to stabilize our financial health even though the budget contains a deficit. We will be hiring a part-time marketing professional to

CBT—The Next Generation

On June 19, I drove Amalia, my 10-year-old, to be dropped off for her first sleep-away camp at Camp Tawonga. It was such a swirl of emotions for me; I was excited for her to be able to have this amazing experience,

and true to being a Jewish mother, I was also nervous to let my baby go for two weeks without the ability to check in on her. Earlier that morning I started to text with Jen and Rebecca, two other mothers in Amalia's class, sharing our feelings as we were heading out for drop-off.

As soon as we arrived at the Camp Tawonga drop-off parking lot, the three CBT girls found each other and were glued to one another; it warmed my heart, and I was able to see Amalia off knowing that she was going to a wonderful experience, albeit the unknown, with her CBT family by her side. In the pictures camp sent daily, Amalia was with her two CBT classmates, and I have no doubt that these three girls will forever remember this summer together.

This experience was a wonderful reminder to me of how central my Jewish community is to my family life. It made me wonder how we might ensure, years into the future, that those three CBT girls text with one another about their own daughters going to camp. How do we bind these relationships for our younger generation and ensure that the Jewish community provides them the same support it does for us?

This coming year, we are investing in exactly that: Ensuring that our younger generation is engaged and has both the skills and the inspiration to lead our community. We hope to accomplish that by focusing on both teens and young adults. We just received a grant from the Contra Costa Jewish Community Center to help us with our new Teen Leadership Program. This program is made up of two separate and related facets:

The first is the creation of a Junior Board, comprised of 15-20 teens who will meet monthly to discuss engagement at CBT. This junior board will make recommendations to our

general board to consider and implement. This program is designed to empower our teens to take an active part in our community, and to help us understand how to support them as they become young adults.

The second is a weekend retreat that will be open to all CBT teens, including our junior board, kids in the madrichim program, and teens who have not been involved since they completed religious school. This retreat is designed to open the door wider and engage more teens, allowing them to build community in a fun weekend, while also learning how to be effective leaders.

Young adults, who are between the ages of 18-30, are also an important cohort in building a strong next generation for our community. This year we are adding a new service to our calendar focused on young adults. On December 9, 2022 we will hold a Shabbat After Hours service at 8:00 pm, geared toward engaging and catering to young adults.

Your participation is much appreciated in making these Next Generation program initiatives a success, as the success of these programs depends on people showing up – yes, it is as simple as that. Reluctant service-goers find a lot of meaning when they connect to others like themselves.

Help us get the word out about our Next Generation programs. Reach out to your neighbors, friends, and even your own family. This will let them know that we care about them, and want them here.

With the success of these new programs, we will truly live our value of I'dor vador.

Inflation, which didn't exist for years, has now eroded our net worth as well as our discretionary income.

I believe we are poised to meet these challenges with our clergy, staff, and board. As CBT's President I believe in our community and welcome these challenges. I hope that our community does too.


